President's message Another Great Year for BPWA—Colleen Neff

When BPWA co-founder Jacque Ensign called me to help get a mailing out, I never imagined how I would grow to love the paths and this organization. I came onto the board five years ago and served as president the last two. It has been my pleasure to work with so many talented people. But now it is time to hand the reins to our new president, Keith Skinner. I cannot imagine this group in more capable. thoughtful, and dedicated hands. Keith has been our Walks Coordinator for five years, bringing energy and imagination to these twice-monthly events.

BPWA had a busy, productive 2011: **Path building:** Last summer we celebrated the opening of Wildcat Path (formerly Path 80) in Park Hills, thanks to the cooperation and support of the Park Hills Neighborhood Association. This rustic path follows the natural contours of the hillside, offering beautiful views as it descends to Wildcat Canyon Road. Miller Path East, connecting Creston Road to Grizzly Peak Boulevard, also was completed this year after much bamboo wrangling. Cal students, Boy Scouts, high school volunteers and community members all pitched in. We now are installing about 160 steps on La Loma Path to join La Loma Avenue to Campus Drive. **Path Maintenance:** With over 130 paths, we always have weeds to clear, brush to cut, and steps to sweep. Many paths got cleaned thanks to hard-working Cal students, the service organization buildOn, generous path neighbors, and countless other volunteers. In addition, Steve Glaeser spearheaded an ambitious project to install gravel between all the wood-tie steps to keep the weeds and mud at bay. Bucket by bucket, Steve has hauled tons of crushed stone onto dozens of our newer paths. We certainly thank him!

Handrails: BPWA is adding handrails to steeper paths. Last year middle Glendale and Shasta Paths got muchneeded handrails, and we look forward to installing more each year.

Guided Walks: We led 30 free, guided walks. Among the favorites were a foraging walk in Tilden Park, Pooches on the Paths, the Poetry Walk, a hike in Claremont Canyon with the Claremont Canyon Conservancy, and our second annual Long Walk. Please walk with us in 2012! **Programs:** Our two, free public meetings featured presentations from Claremont Canyon Conservancy in February and the Greenbelt Alliance in October. The Handrails Project

BPWA is committed to installing handrails on some completed paths each year. Added in 2011 are railings on Middle Glendale Path and the lower part of Shasta Path. Six New Lamps Mark the Centennial of the Le Roy Steps—Glen Lindwall

When Berkeley's Le Roy Avenue was being built 100 years ago, the last half block leading up to Hilgard was too steep for a road. The developers ended Le Roy Avenue in the middle of the block and installed a graceful stairway with brick ramps between each course of steps.

Pairs of gas lamps stood on pillars at each end, lighting the way for pedestrians on their way to and from trolley stops, shops, and the nearby UC campus.

By 2004, however, the gas lamps were long gone, and the grounds on either side of the steps were strewn with trash and overgrown with weeds and brambles. What began that year as an effort to remove graffiti from the stairs by a couple of Hilgard Ave. neighbors, slowly evolved into the Le Roy Steps Stewardship Project. The group joined Berkeley Partners for Parks, a nonprofit umbrella organization, which makes it a sister organization of BPWA.

BPWA 1442-A Walnut Street - #269 Berkeley, CA 94709 Project members have spent countless hours removing the weeds and trash and planting flowers that would provide year-round blossoms and be unpalatable to deer. Perhaps most spectacular are the 1,000 daffodils that bloom in all their glory in February and March.

Last year, the Stewardship Project received a University of California Chancellor's Grant and a grant from Pacific Gas and Electric Company, which enabled the Project to have electric lamps installed on the cement pillars lining the steps. The lamps are now in place, making the steps safer and more inviting for pedestrians after dark.

The Stewardship Committee would like to continue their efforts with the restoration of a small,

hand-made brick retaining wall. The wall survived the devastating 1923 fire but to-day leans precariously

in the midst of the daffodils. Volunteers continue to experiment with new plantings, all the while working to improve the soil and clear remaining rubble and weeds.

You might visit the new lamps as part of an evening stroll, or perhaps some sunny day in the early spring you'll want to visit this path, only four blocks from campus, just for the daffodils.
