BPWA's 13th Annual Path-a-thon is Sunday, July 10th: Celebrating Southside Paths With Three Walks, One Picnic

Mark your calendars for our lucky 13th Annual Path-a-thon on Sunday, July 10. We will offer three guided walks that leave at staggered times and vary in distance

Each walk starts in front of John Muir School (2955 Claremont Avenue) and will return there by 11:45.

Unfortunately, the grounds of the school are closed during a major construction project, so our traditional BYO picnic will be at nearby Monkey Island Park, located at Garber St. and Claremont Blvd., a short walk or drive from the school.

We will provide lemonade and our always-delicious carrot cake.

Throughout the morning, our pop-up store will be open for business in front of John Muir, featuring BPWA tee shirts, caps, tote bags, walking guidebooks, notecards, posters, and — of course — our best-selling map, *Berkeley and Its Pathways*.

Sandy Friedland will lead the

most challenging walk, starting at 9:45. This 5-mile route passes behind the Clark Kerr campus and by the new steps, installed by BPWA path builders, at the top of Dwight

Way. Walkers will continue to Orchard Lane to start climbing Panoramic Hill. Be prepared for steep stairs and streets, architectural gems, and wideangle views. You'll return via the lower Jordan Fire Trail and a hidden path with some uneven footing through a redwood forest.

The moderate walk will leave at 10:15 led by Elsa Tranter. Her route wends through the hilly streets and paths below the Claremont Hotel. You'll see noteworthy homes, colorful gardens, and Bay

views. To finish with some heartpumping aerobics, Elsa will head up some of the Stonewall-Panoramic Trail in the Claremont Canyon Regional Preserve.

Those who prefer an easy, family-friendly stroll, should meet **Kay Englund** at 10:45. She'll lead you along some lovely streets, let you smell the roses at St. Clements Church, and show you some yard art and interesting gates. Grand mansions abound, including one with stone lions that houses a renowned Feng Shui master. The route includes Oak Knoll Path, which is steep but has no stairs.

So pick your walk, pack your lunch, and bring your family and friends to this fun event.

Start: Water sculpture (officially the "Class of 1914 Fountain"), north side of Bancroft Way at end of College Avenue

This two-mile walk includes some of the more fascinating sites on the Cal Campus. The route winds from Boalt Hall to University House and back, mostly on level pavement except for a few stairs. An expert in history and architecture, Ron will point out interesting buildings and some campus eccentricities, among them statues, ranging from the scandalous to the eminently respectable; a real mine shaft; and an outdoor museum of rocks. The walk will proceed at a moderate pace with frequent stops for commentary, anecdotes, and questions. Bring a flashlight to peer into the mine shaft. Looking for a quick bit of exercise and some camaraderie on a Sunday morning? This easy, 1.5-mile paved walk may fit the bill. Wayne, an 18-year resident of this area, will point out the site of the original #10 Firehouse on Shasta Road, designed by James W. Plachek in 1948 but now converted into a residence, and the one that replaced it more than fifty years later. Construction of the new firehouse at the edge of Tilden Park culminated years of effort by the neighborhood to improve its fire protection. The route includes climbing two stair paths.

Dogs and humans of any age are welcome, of course, but this route through the lovely Claremont-Uplands neighborhood will be fairly flat and covered at a leisurely stop-and-smell-the-roses pace. You'll have a chance to pick up a coffee and pastries on Domingo Avenue before our doggy-biscuit break at Monkey Island Park.

Start: Peet's at 1825 Solano Avenue

Join one of BPWA's co-founders on this easy ramble. You'll visit Berkelev's first columbarium at the Northbrae Community Church as well as the Sacred Hoop Meditation Garden that honors Native American spirituality. You also will see the site that was proposed for the State Capitol in 1908. Jacque's route will include some rock parks and a few of the paths that she has enjoyed since she was a child, including Fountain Walk and Mendocino Path, The walk will cover about two miles with some mild hills. Jacque also will offer a shorter, flatter option.

Pooches-On-The-Paths Walks Delight Dogs and Their People

Pooches on the Paths began in 2009 when then-walk coordinator Keith Skinner wanted to try offering some walks geared to dogs and dog lovers. He asked Lynn Deregowski and her dog Bronte to help lead them. Keith assured her he would help with logistics.

"You didn't have to twist the paw of my Lab mix to say yes! " recalls Lynn, who soon joined the BPWA board.

The first few walks attracted a great mix of friendly people and dogs, so BPWA continued to schedule them. When Bronte began to slow down, Lynn's younger dog Figgy took over.

In 2015, former BPWA board member Betsy Mueller and her dog Wally, regulars on the pooches walks, began helping Lynn plan and lead greenways, and it's great fun showing people places in Berkeley they never knew existed.

Betsy: To our surprise, we found 55 official parks on the BPWA map and several unofficial ones, so we had our work cut out for us! So far in our series, we've visited 14 parks, including two of those unofficial ones.

Do Wally and Figgy enjoy the walks?

Lynn: Figgy loves welcoming the twoand four-footed walkers by rolling on her back, indicating "my belly may be rubbed now." She is also a world champion sniffer, and getting to visit all these new parks is heavenly. **Betsy:** Wally's favorite part is meeting all the new pooches. She's very social, really a universal "Type-0" dog: She seems to get along with everyone.

Betsy: No. All the dogs on our walks are friendly, well-behaved, and lovely together. Most of the time, the dogs are on leash, and they do very well on the stair paths. We do try to have at least one off-leash stop so the dogs can run free.

Are you involved with other organizations dedicated to dogs?

Lynn: Rescue dogs are close to both Betsy's and my heart. I spend a lot of time with rescue animals as a dog walker and bio writer for Berkeley Animal Care Services (BACS), our municipal shelter. I'm on the board of Friends of BACS and have raised service dogs for people with disabilities. Figgy is one of those dogs but didn't make the cut. She's known as a change-of-career dog.

Betsy: Wally comes from ARF (Animal Rescue Foundation) in Walnut Creek. It was love at first sight. I was supposed to "interview" five dogs at ARF, and Wally was the first. She was so loving and adorable, I just said, "I'll take this one!"

Eleanor also made an important change to the BPWA mission statement that Pat had drafted. The original read: "Dedicated to the creation, preservation, and restoration of public paths, steps, and walkways in Berkeley for the use and enjoyment of all citizens."

"She wanted it to be more inclusive." said Pat, "so she cut the word citizens."

The women held their first open meeting May 20, 1998. To their delight, more than 100 people turned out, and BPWA was born.

"Eleanor was very smart, pleasant to work with, and assumed the thankless job of taking minutes at all our meetings," Jacque said.

Born in Duluth, MN, Eleanor raised her family in South Nyack, NY, but she moved to Berkeley in 1989 to be closer to her children and grandchildren. She lived in a tiny, beautifully appointed cottage behind the house of her daughter Austene Hall.

She immersed herself in Berkeley civic life, serving on the Shade Tree Commission and the Commission on Aging, working for the Democratic Party, and joining the Berkeley Architectural Heritage Association.

Austene describes her mother as an independent thinker and lifelong learner who loved history. geography, and English grammar and read five books a week. She also was a master gardener.

"She was a woman of varied talents," Austene said, "who made her mark on the world in so many ways. We were never bored around her."
